### Plymouth First United Methodist Church Message from Pastor Bob

"Look! I'm doing a new thing; now it sprouts up; don't you recognize it? I'm making a way in the desert, paths in the wilderness." (Isaiah 43:19, CEB)

This faith thing can be challenging. What I mean is, the Apostle Paul defines faith in his letter to the Hebrews, writing, "*Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see*" (Heb 11:1), which can be really challenging for us who live in a "seeing is believing" world. But I think his words are also a source of encouragement and affirmation, because even with all the causes that may be obscuring our view, we can still stand confident that God is always up to something very good in the world and in our lives. The question becomes, can we position ourselves such that we can perceive or recognize it. My position as Lead Pastor uniquely *positions* me the privilege of seeing a great many of the new things that take place within our church. As my last Beacon cover article for this year, let me share with you some exciting new things taking place here at PFUMC as we wind down 2022 and enter into 2023.

Two of those new things involve new partnerships with local community organizations already doing great mission work. First, we are partnering with the *A dult A utism Transition Program*, of Plymouth-Canton Community Schools to provide a training venue supporting students being equipped with skills for how to live in the world. Starting this past October, we weekly host a group and provide opportunities to develop various skills, gain experience, and come away with a sense of accomplishment and self-esteem. Special thanks to Jillian Hoard for making this ministry partnership possible.

Secondly, we are partnering with New Hope Center for Grief Support to be a location for expanding their ministry offerings in 2023, initially for their *Circles of Hope Family Fridays* program which provides a family-centered approach to grief support by investing in children, supporting parents, and strengthening the family. I know many of you have personal experience with the commitment and quality of this organization, and this is a perfect fit with our core value of strengthening and equipping families.

On the topic of families and children, I would be remiss if I did not again mention our Sunday School Reboot initiative targeted for formal launch this winter, led by Pastor Suzy and Cathy Montgomery, and supported by the efforts of so many of you. We continue to see increases in children attendance at our Sunday worship services, signaling the importance of quality children focused faith formation. I hope you will prayerfully consider how you may participate in such an important ministry.

Another formal launch taking place early in the new year is our new Digital Campus which is aimed at reaching the ever-growing group of unchurched and de-churched. This exciting new ministry, led by Pastor Jackie, will greatly expand our reach with Christ's Gospel, doing our part in transforming our community and the world. Thank you for all the support you have already provided and will continue to provide into the coming year.

By the way, a special *Thank You* to all of you who had any part if making our October Happy Festival a success. Your efforts led to our raising funds and sending \$700 to both the Living Learning Enrichment Center and the New Hope Center for Grief Support.

We live in a world where it is so easy to only see desert and wilderness. But we are encouraged to look for what God is up to in the world and, even more, what God is up to with us and in us. I know God is doing new and good things in our midst, and we get to be an intimate part of it. I cannot think of a better Christmas present, as we work our way through Advent and towards our celebration of birth of our Lord Jesus.

May this season be filled with God's light.





## Commit to reading the ENTIRE Bible in 2023.



Greetings Friends,

First, I would like to say thank you all for your kindness in making Anthony and me feel welcome here at Plymouth 1st UMC. It has been a pleasure to be on staff here, and we both enjoy the conversations and encouragement you give us.

These past few months, there have been two training sessions with two of the top professionals in the United Methodist denomination who have come to Plymouth 1st to share and teach us about the idea of Fresh Expressions. First, we had Rev. Rachel Gilmore, who primarily worked with us regarding the Plymouth community. We looked at our demographics through the MissionInsite reports. We saw areas the church could reach out to by forming small groups to build relationships with those in our community.

Then, we had Rev. Dr. Michael Beck come to Plymouth 1st, a conference event we hosted. Michael Beck shared the theological reasons we need to consider Fresh Expressions at our church. With churches declining, we need to rethink how we will reach people for the kingdom; most importantly, as disciples of Christ, we need to go to the people just like Jesus did. Jesus didn't sit in the temple waiting for people to show up. Jesus went out to the people and formed relationships.

There are many ways to start a Fresh Expression, and I hope you may consider what kind of Fresh Expression you can begin. Maybe it's through a book club, running group, or even a group that likes to go out to eat and ask how you can pray for each other that week—so many opportunities for us to connect with those in our community.
