Message from Pastor Suzy

Friends -

For the last couple of years I have led an anti-racism study in the church. We've read a dozen or more books ranging from The Vanishing Half, a novel, to The Color of Law, a dense book about how the codes and laws of the country have sustained segregation beyond the time it was ruled illegal by the courts. We've read books that specifically address the ways racism is inconsistent with Christianity and the reasons that most churches remain singular in their racial composition. Jemar Tisby's book, How to Fight Racism, challenged us to move beyond reading and education into relationship with people of other races.

For our last study, we joined with the Garden City church and some members from West Outer Drive UMC. Most of them were BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) people. This expanded the way that we were able to engage with the book and discuss the issue of anti-racism work as well as how to be a good ally with people who are discriminated against. We will continue that relationship in hopes of expanding it beyond our group and into the fuller body of the church.

On that note, we've planned an outing with Garden City UMC and will be inviting people from other nearby United Methodist Churches to join us too. On July 30, 2022 we will be taking a tour of the Detroit sites that are important to the history of anti-racism in Detroit. We will have two official guides for this tour known as the Arc of Justice tour. If you have not read the book by that name, it is a great place to start to understand racism and Detroit. It is a true story that takes place during the Great Migration when the Sweet family dares to cross color lines and how the neighbors reacted. On the tour, we will see where the Sweet family home stood. We will see the Birwood Wall of segregation, Black Bottom neighborhood and the Algiers Motel and more. We'll end our tour with lunch at a Black-owned restaurant.

If you are interested in learning about Detroit and its history with race, consider joining us. We'll meet at the first site in Detroit at 9AM and will finish at lunch time. The entire tour will be outside, and thus quite covid safe. They do not charge for the tour but ask for a donation to be made to their churches. Please RSVP to me before July 21, so that we can get a good headcount.

I want to say thank you to this church. When one is called to ministry, they never know what that road is going to look like. My road began in 1994, I was in the tenth grade. I knew then that God had placed a call on my life to work with young people. He placed me on a path to do that. I never imagined the twists and turns that this journey would take me on. In 2012, God brought our family to Plymouth First and I became a part of the staff in 2015.

I will always be grateful for the time I have had as a part of the PFUMC staff and family. It is difficult to go. We have walked through unprecedented times together, and our church has certainly seen the effects of that. I have tried really hard to keep things afloat and to rebuild throughout and in the ongoing aftermath with a limited group of volunteers. It has been said that insanity is doing the same thing over and over and expecting a different result (that quote is often attributed to Albert Einstein; there is actually no evidence he ever said it). I am doing the same things here over and over, and if it was working, that would be one thing. It isn't. Nothing I try seems to work. We aren't reaching new families who are consistently coming back, the youth group hasn't grown, Sunday school has stayed pretty consistent for the last year (numbers are low); that means it hasn't grown, our Easter outreach event was not successful. These are facts, and have played a part in my decision to move on. The decision was a difficult one to come to, and it was not taken lightly. When you love your job and the children and youth you are able to work with, it shouldn't be easy. There were many prayers and tears. My heart is sad because I will miss these children, these young people. I also have great peace because I can't help but think of all the good things God has in store for Plymouth First.

I want the best for this church. I want the families, youth, and children of the Plymouth, Canton, and surrounding areas to know Jesus loves them. That is all that matters on an eternal level. God has big plans for this place and I can't wait to see what He does here. I want to challenge you as a church to take risks as you step into a new season. You are getting an additional pastor who is going to lead a digital campus. You are going to have to embrace new things if you want to see this place become all it can be. That can be scary, don't be afraid to do it. I have heard tales about how things used to be around here in years past almost since the day our family walked in the door. I would caution you that as you celebrate the rich history of PFUMC that you hold on loosely. If you cling too tightly to what you loved about what was, you will never be open to what God wants to do right now. It would be tragic for you to miss out on what God is trying do now because you are busy looking back at what he did then. Don't miss it.

My son is about to turn thirteen (thirteen; I can hardly believe it!). Every year around this time, I get very nostalgic, remembering him as a baby. I allow myself to do it for just a few moments because I don't want to miss who he is now. That little guy who was so squishy and rolly-polly has grown up into a pretty awesome kid that I would miss out on if I just buried my head in his baby book. Sure I could look at who he was and enjoy those memories, but who he is right now matters a lot more. Who he is now is so very important.

The same is true for Plymouth First. This church is a great church, today. Great things are in store because an even greater God is in control. I will say it again; Don't miss it.!



What does it look like to be an Apprentice of Jesus?



2022 ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Hello Church Family,

I am a lifelong Methodist, but this is my first time being a delegate at an Annual Conference. I went into the conference thinking it was going to be primarily administrative. In my professional and personal life I have been on different boards, so I was comfortable with the process and prepared for the agenda. To my pleasant surprise I found that the items that were voted on, while important, were not my primary take-away from the conference. Certainly, they are necessary for the operation of the church and I have provided a link below if you wish to review the motions. But what impacted me most can be best described as renewal and connections.

Renewal as in renewal of faith, renewal of friendships and renewal of mission. I was impacted by the messages from Bishop Bard in the opening service, and guest speakers Dr. Ron Bell, a pastor from St. Paul who spoke on dealing with the pervasive stress and tension of the past couple of years and Derrick Scott the Executive Director of a campus ministry in Florida who spoke at a laity only session. A link to the video for Friday's session is below with the times for Ron and Derrick, I encourage you to have a look. On Friday night, there was an ordination service for Deacons and Elders. It was inspiring watching others reach plateaus in their life's mission of serving Christ. The service included the ordination as an Elder of Amy Triebwasser. Amy was a member of our church, and I can remember when she took the first step to becoming a pastor. She will be serving at Saline first UMC starting July 1st.

I enjoyed watching the clergy in attendance (including ours) get recharged by being together. This may have been accentuated as the last two years have been virtual, but it was clear there are great friendships and bonds between pastors. I did not previously appreciate how these connections clearly helped strengthen them to serve Christ. As we listened to presentations of the great works being done by churches in service to their communities, including our church being highlighted for our upcoming digital campus, you couldn't help feeling connected as one body. It was great to be reminded of how our congregation is not isolated, but part of a larger entity that even with the changes were are experiencing, is working in unison to serve Christ.

United Methodist Church of Michigan Annual Conference

I was given the opportunity to be an alternate and attend this year's Annual Conference, "Mourning to Dancing." I was in awe as I entered this governing body of over 1,500 fellow Methodists. Each session was blessed with music, prayer, and praise. Pastor Dr. Ron Bell and Lay Leader, Derrick Scott provided inspirational messages. I must admit that I never truly knew the magnitude of what this body of believers was all about. Several issues that were covered included Gun Violence Legislation, Federal Student Loan cancellation, support of a maternity clinic in Haiti, help for Ukrainian refugees, child hunger in Michigan, and financial support for Liberian children to attend school. Annual Conference will be endorsing Kennetha Bingham Tsai for consideration as bishop. On a sadder note, information was shared that 10 UMC churches have closed or will be closing by year end and 4 additional churches have chosen to disaffiliate from the United Methodist Church. This was an eye awakening and educational experience and I thank our congregation for this opportunity. Sharyn Hoard

The conference title, "Mourning and Dancing" proved to be an appropriate theme with all the challenges and decision- making presently in the United Methodist Church. A worship service with inspirational speakers, both laity and clergy, began each of our days. My favorite moments centered around worship time with 2000 people singing hymns-it was amazing to be a part of that group which left each and everyone of us energized, and feeling the presence of God, along with a delightful sense of community.

It was wonderful to be able to meet in person again after meeting online the last two years. Although we are moving toward the final stages with the UMC split, there seemed to be a more peaceful tone which I would probably attribute to the fact that we know the split is inevitable and many people know which direction they are moving toward.

General conference will meet in 2024 to take a final vote. As church delegates continue to work toward these important decisions, we would do well to pray for a smooth transition and continue to respect the opinions of others-no matter how different those opinions are from our point of view.

"I know the plans I have in mind for you, declares the Lord; they are plans for peace, not disaster, to give you a future filled with hope." (Jeremiah 29:11 CEB) We need to put our trust in HIM.
