

Message from Pastor Bob

#### "I know the plans I have in mind for you, declares the Lord; they are plans for peace, not disaster, to give you a future filled with hope." (Jeremiah 29:11, CEB)

Nearly four years ago, to the day, Pastor Suzy and I formally began our new appointments here at Plymouth First UMC, preaching on our very first day on Staff, July 1, 2018. To be honest, these past four years almost seem like a blink to me. Which is a bit mind boggling as so much has happened within these past four years. Some of what happened was wonderful, like being embraced by and received into such a committed, talented, and deeply loving faith family ... this I will be grateful for the rest of my life. Some things have been anything but wonderful. Not the least of which was the passing of Rochelle, which rocked all of our worlds. Still, through it all, God did not waste the opportunity to demonstrate how God can be counted on to make good His promises to transform tragedy into triumph, and to lead God's people to a life more incredible than words can describe.

Yes, we have been dealing with some challenges. Just as we were starting to regain our momentum towards revitalizing our church, the COVID global pandemic pulled the rug right out from under our feet. It not only turned upside down virtually every way we knew and cherished of engaging in church, but it effectively delayed some of the key strategic growth initiatives we had lined up for two years. In addition, the ongoing topic of separation within The United Methodist Church has created confusion and added to the mistrust toward church, with both the un-churched and in-church alike.

Still, given all of this, while we may have lost a bit of weight, and our stride may have shortened accordingly, I believe our present foundational health positions us to build strength and wellness in a way we cannot presently imagine. (Sorry for all the cliches, but I hope you get what I am trying to say). We have made continuous and enumerable strategic adjustments in content and facilities that continue to increase the quality of our worship experience. We have been recognized for how we have made that quality worship experience available through our online LiveStream to people that, for a multitude of reasons, could not previously participate. Continuing forward, we will be bolstering our long-term dream of a substantive and growing PFUMC Digital Campus, making us a multi-campus church, but more importantly substantially increasing our outreach of Christ's Gospel to people historically never before within our reach, by the addition of a dedicated Digital Campus Pastor.

That dedicated Digital Campus Pastor is being made possible by the appointment of Rev Jackie Raineri to the PFUMC Clergy Staff beginning this July 1. Pastor Jackie will also be leading our overall congregation's new *Fresh Expressions* initiative (by the way, one of the initiatives delayed by COVID). We will be learning much more in the coming months, but in short, *Fresh Expressions* is aimed at creating Spirit-led natural communities and relationships, that especially include people not presently engaged with church life. I think it is also notable that Pastor Jackie's appointment to us by the UMC Michigan Conference is a huge vote of confidence in who we are and what we are all about here at PFUMC.

Now admittedly, our road ahead *is* somewhat uncharted, but our overall direction has never been clearer. Was well, we can certainly expect some surprises along the way that will undoubtedly require some intentional navigation. But isn't that the case with just about everything in life that is good and truly important? But even more, we are following a faithful and trustworthy God, whose plans are *"for peace, not disaster, to give [us] a future filled with hope."* Our view over the horizon shows an incredible sunrise, full of hope and promise, and God's blessing. And if I have learned *anything* in the past two years, is that with faith, I can count on that with my life. I hope you may believe that as much as I do.

I specifically want to thank Breanna Anderson, Amy Brown, Stacy Buster, Karen Morin, and Chantel Spieth for their help over the couple of years. Stacy and Amy have been our Fusion volunteers since I took over leadership, well before the pandemic. the pipe organ plays untouched by feet or fingers leading hymn singing

You may have noticed on several recent Sundays during Sanctuary worship, the pipe organ has played without the presence of an organist on the bench, namely me. Our organ console, which was built in 2015, is equipped with a system that allows recording and playback. This is possible because the console, which is where the organist plays, "talks" to the pipes and windchests in the organ chamber through a system very much like a computer. Digital signals get sent from the console as someone plays and those signals help activate the mechanisms that supply wind to pipes that correspond to the keys pressed and make them produce sound.

Part of this digital system allows the organist to activate a recording system, play a piece of music, then save the recording in the organ's memory. Anyone, organist or not, who knows how to operate the playback can then have the organ play the piece back. The organ's computerized control system will play the piece exactly as the organist played it while recording –

same tempo, same changes of sounds, as well as any mistakes that are made. Although the organist is not physically present, the organ's playback system allows that organist to be heard playing just as if he or she were there. Pretty handy!

I've used the playback system to record organ music for CDs, which saves a lot of time for the recording technician, allowing a piece to be captured in one take. I also found the playback system handy for making recordings with the choir when we were producing videos for worship weekly. The system has been very helpful as I've dealt with some health issues, allowing me to pre-record hymns and organ pieces during the week to be used on Sunday if needed.




